

COSLA Migration, Population & Diversity Team: Business Plan 2024/25

COSLA (the Convention of Scottish Local Authorities) is a membership organisation that represents the interests of local authorities in Scotland. COSLA's Migration, Population and Diversity (MPD) Team pursues a varied and wide-ranging agenda to address key issues relating to migration and ethnic minority groups in Scotland. The team has responsibility for a broad range of policy issues including work relating to asylum seekers, refugees and current resettlement programmes, the UK Immigration system, population and demographic change and Gypsy/Traveller communities in Scotland. In addition, the team hosts Scotland's Strategic Migration Partnership (SMP), a function funded by the Home Office to provide coordination across the UK's various humanitarian programmes.

This has recently been updated and relaunched as a means of providing more accessible information on our policy work, as well as various resources for partners across the public, private and voluntary sectors who support migrants in Scotland. Governance and oversight of our work is provided by means of <u>COSLA's political structures</u>. These consist of Convention, Leaders' Meetings and Policy Boards and ensure that our activities are directed by the priorities of our member councils. Convention provides strategic oversight to the work of the organisation and consists of representatives from all member councils and political groups represented within Scottish Local Government. Leaders is COSLA's main decision-making body comprising the Leaders of each of our 32 member councils. It meets at least eight times per year. There are four thematic Policy Boards composed of elected members from every member council. These allow the core work of COSLA to be progressed through policy debate and exploration and each meets six times per year.

This business plan sets out our agreed outcomes, objectives and activities for 2024/25. The team is in receipt of funding from the Home Office, DLUHC, the Scottish Government and the European Commission to deliver on this work.

COSLA MPD Team Outcomes for 2024/25

The work of the MPD Team is underpinned by the overarching vision and priorities of COSLA as set out in the <u>COSLA Plan 2022 – 2027</u>. The role of COSLA is to help councils build better and more equal local communities, and to do that we seek to empower local decision making and enable councils to do what works locally. More specifically, the Plan has a focus on supporting the most vulnerable in our communities by: driving the system changes needed to realise the human rights of all those living in our communities; proactively shaping and delivering programmes which support people who are seeking sanctuary in the UK; and working to address the risks of exclusion and destitution faced by migrants.

We have also taken into account the <u>National Performance Framework (NPF)</u>, reflecting COSLA's ongoing commitment to work with Scottish Government and other partners towards delivering on agreed national outcomes. We seek to hold an overview of the issues affecting the most vulnerable communities and liaise across other COSLA teams to ensure consideration and inclusion in all relevant policy areas.

To that end, the outcomes that we are working towards in 2024/25 are as follows:

- 1. We are influencing policy and legislation relating to migration and demographic change
- 2. We are proactively shaping and delivering programmes which support people who are seeking sanctuary in the UK
- 3. We are working to address the risks of exclusion, exploitation and destitution faced by migrants
- 4. We are supporting and driving system changes that realise the rights of migrants and minority ethnic communities
